While the political climate is rife with division, attacks on equity and justice, and violence both within and outside of our borders, we remain focused and steadfast in our efforts to uphold our mission: to promote effective and responsive philanthropy in Black communities. Our strength is fueled by the close to three hundred new foundation and nonprofit sector leaders who joined ABFE in 2023, indicating our continued leadership and relevance in the field. This report outlines several of our 2023 highlights as well as ABFE's impact and influence in the field. I encourage you to review this document and share your feedback on what resonates with you.

Regardless of how we plan our annual work, ABFE is called to respond to current issues and events facing our community. 2023 was no different – the heightened attacks on democracy, racial equity, and justice, fueled by the gutting of Affirmative Action in the spring of last year, required us to make space and time to organize the field. In partnership with others, we took leadership to design opportunities for the field to strategize and "scenario plan" about ways to navigate the hostile political environment. Most importantly, we fashioned a strategy for the field inclusive of building legal supports for racial justice grantees in

hostile climate. This work will continue long into the coming years. We are excited about member engagement to grow investments in Black communities within our new funder networks including the Black



In 2020, we launched a strategic plan that centered on ABFE's commitment to promote effective and responsive philanthropy in Black communities. The following four strategic pillars are part of our \$25M campaign priorities. Here's a quick snapshot of the activities and initiatives that ABFE organized Organize Collective Investments in Black-led Social Change to Build Political and Economic Power. In response to a pivotal 2023 Supreme Court decision to overturn Affirmative Action, ABFE launched the Racial Equity Advancement and Defense Initiative (READI). This initiative includes the development of a resource bank, aimed to equip the philanthropic and nonprofit sectors with essential tools for navigating legal frameworks while passionately advocating for racial justice.


